Labor in the Lord

Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain – 1 Cor. 15:58

On New Year's Day 1956, five missionaries, Nate Saint, Jim Elliot, Pete Fleming, Ed McCully, and Roger Youderian, prepared to make contact with the Auca Indians of Ecuador. The Aucas were a fierce tribe known for their hostile treatment of outsiders. As the five men packed for their journey, Jim Elliot's wife, Betty, wondered, "Will this be the last time I'll help him pack?"

On the day of their departure, January 3, the five men ate breakfast and afterward sang one of their favorite hymns:

We rest on thee, our Shield and our Defender, Thine is the battle, thine will be the praise. When passing through the gates of pearly splendor Victors, we rest with thee through endless days.

Saying goodbye to their families, the men climbed into their small aircraft and departed for a jungle beach where they hoped to contact the Aucas. Once they landed, they built a tree house and waited for the Aucas to arrive. On Friday, January 6, an Auca man and two women came to visit, which greatly encouraged the missionaries. Hopeful that their friendly encounter with the three Aucas was an indication of good things to come, the missionaries eagerly awaited another visit.

However, they had no further contact with the Aucas until two days later, on Sunday at 12:30 p.m., when several Auca men came to their site. Nate Saint then made a radio call to his wife informing her of the visit and asking that she and the other wives pray for them. He promised to recontact her at 4:30 p.m. with an update.

When 4:30 came, the missionary wives turned on their radio. Silence. Five minutes went by and then ten. When the sun set there was still no word from their husbands. Fearful of the worst, the wives slept very little Sunday night.

On Monday morning, January 9, a missionary pilot, affiliated with a different organization, flew to the beach and spotted the aircraft but the missionaries were nowhere to be seen. A ground party was organized that day to search for the men. On Wednesday, January 11, the lifeless bodies of the five missionaries were found on the beach.


From a purely human perspective, this mission endeavor was a failure. It was a waste of life. Five young men were murdered by the Aucas. They and their wives had left the comforts of America and moved to the jungles of Ecuador to proclaim the gospel to an unreached people and they died without a single convert. "What a waste," someone may say. But that is the human perspective on the matter. It is not God's. He views things differently and tells us our labor in the Lord, whatever that labor may be, is never in vain. Even if it bears no immediate results.

And we can see this is true by what happened after the five missionaries died at the hands of the Auca Indians. For even though they did not live to see one Auca come to Christ, their wives and children did.

In 1958, Betty Elliot and Rachel Saint, Nate's sister, continued the ministry to the Auca Indians and one by one, they put their faith in Jesus Christ. Even the men who murdered the five missionaries trusted in Christ and became spiritual leaders among their people.

And in June of 1965, nine years after the five men were killed by the Aucas, two of Nate Saint's children, Kathy and Stephen, were baptized on the beach where their father died by two of his killers. I am reminded of the words of the early church father, Tertullian, who wrote, "the blood of the martyrs is the seed of the church." The five missionaries did not die in vain.

Nothing we do for the sake of Christ and his kingdom is a waste of time. Therefore, for this new year and every year God gives us breath, let us, as Paul writes, "be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord." For we can know that our labor in the Lord, whatever that labor may be, is never in vain. God gives us his word.




