### The Reformation Begins

For by grace, you have been saved through faith.

And this is not your own doing; it is the gift
of God, not a result of works, so that
no one may boast – Eph. 8-9

Many people throughout the nation will be celebrating Halloween on October 31. In my neighborhood, Halloween decorations are already in place at many homes and have been there for weeks. Clearly, Halloween is a big day for a lot of people. In fact, it is second only to Christmas in terms of spending. In 2024, Americans spent approximately \$11.6 billion dollars on Halloween purchases.

Personally, I'm not a fan of Halloween, but I do regard the day on which it is observed as an important day in Church history. For on October 31, 1517 the Protestant Reformation began in earnest when Martin Luther, an Augustinian monk, nailed his Ninety-five Theses on the Castle Church door in Wittenberg, Germany. Luther's act challenged the spiritual and political authority of the Roman Catholic Church and started a movement that reshaped the religious, cultural, and political landscape of Europe and beyond.

Luther's Ninety-five Theses was a scholarly critique of the sale of indulgences by the Roman Catholic Church. At the time Luther wrote the Ninety-five Theses, Johann Tetzel, a Dominican friar, was aggressively marketing indulgences to fund the renovation of St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. According to Tetzel, those who purchased an indulgence would receive remission of purgatory. Indulgences could also be purchased on behalf of dead relatives and friends who, according to Roman Catholic teaching, were then suffering in purgatory. Hence, Tetzel urged people to quickly purchase the indulgence, claiming, "As soon as the coin in the coffer rings, the soul from purgatory springs."

This was too much for Martin Luther, the professor of biblical studies at the University of Wittenberg, so by way of his Ninety-five Theses, he set out to expose the sale of indulgences as a contradiction of the gospel claim that salvation was a gift from God and not a commodity to be bought.

Although Luther wrote the Ninety-five Theses in Latin, intending them to be discussed by scholars and not circulated among the general populace, they were quickly translated from Latin into German and widely distributed. As he himself acknowledged, "In a fortnight they flew all over Germany." In fact, they traveled well beyond Germany, even as far away as Rome, igniting debate and dissent throughout Europe.

For the next two decades, after the Ninety-five Theses were posted, Luther saw the Reformation grow. Many regions in Germany accepted the evangelical doctrines that he and other Reformers discovered in the Scriptures. During his lifetime, Luther wrote several Christian hymns, two catechisms, and a German translation of the Bible.

Ever mindful that salvation is by grace alone, through faith alone, in Christ alone, apart from works, Luther preached and taught God's promise of redemption to the repentant sinner. On his deathbed he prayed, "O Lord Jesus Christ, I commend my poor soul to Thee. O Heavenly Father, I know that, although I shall be taken from this life, I shall live forever with Thee. God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that whosoever believeth on Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. Father, into Thy hands I comment my spirit."

Martin Luther died on February 18, 1546, at the age of sixty-two. Four days later, his casket was carried through the door of Castle Church in Wittenburg, on which, more than twenty-eight years prior, October 31, 1517, he had nailed his Ninety-five Theses. Little did Luther realize the Reformation he would begin when he protested the sale of indulgences by the Roman Catholic Church. As one author writes, "Martin Luther's hammer strike echoed far beyond Wittenberg. It was the sound of a world waking up."


